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Artistic Director Report

In 2008, we created the ACO's first film, *Musica Surfica*, an exploration of music and surfing that was made by a small but dedicated crew on remote King Island. Our ambitions only grew from there, with the making of films including *The Reef*, our record-breaking collaboration with Jennifer Peedom, *Mountain*, and more recently, *River*.

I have always been fascinated by the connection between music and film.

In 2021 we pushed our explorations of film further still. In a first for the ACO, we conceived ACO StudioCasts, a series of cinematic, immersive concert films released alongside our annual national touring program. The classical concert format has remained static for centuries and, after more than a decade of filmmaking, a season of concert films was a natural evolution for us.

Our inaugural ACO StudioCasts season saw the premiere of seven 50-minute bespoke films, created in collaboration between the ACO and brilliant Australian director Matisse Ruby, along with cinematographers Tyson Perkins and Drew English and editor Phoenix Chisholm. These films were watched by our audiences around Australia and internationally in full on our ACO StudioCasts platform nearly 10,000 times, viewed across our social channels over 180,000 times, and represent an exciting new realm for the ACO that seeks to transform and expand expectations of what a concert can be and do.

Our live concert activities saw the ACO perform 56 live concerts to over 24,700 audience members, from Sydney and Melbourne to Bellingen and Armidale. I can't think of a more fitting way to have opened our 2021 Season than with *Tabula Rasa*, a concert that served as a reminder of music and art's ability to prevail throughout history's darkest moments. I was honoured to share the stage with Principal Violin Satu Vänskä and our ACO colleagues for Arvo Pärt's extraordinary work for two violins and orchestra, followed by Shostakovich's Chamber Symphony. This is music that is as relevant today, as when it was first performed.

We continued our 2021 Season with *Beethoven & Bridgetower*. This collaboration with Belvoir's Eamon Flack, writer Anna Goldsworthy, and narrator Angela Nica Sullen, based on writings by the great American poet Rita Dove, sought to correct one of music history's great injustices: the removal of the great virtuoso violinist George Bridgetower from his deserved place in music history.

For our first concerts in Melbourne and Canberra for the 2021 Season, my ACO colleagues and I gave a performance of Schubert's String Quintet. While we didn't know it at the time, these concerts were to be our last for six months due to COVID lockdowns across Australia, which, devastatingly, saw the cancellation of three of our national tours – *Baroque Revelry, River* and *Music For Healing*.

Despite these setbacks, I am proud to say that the ACO was one of the first back on stage in November, at Sydney's City Recital Hall. And what a joy it was to return to the concert hall. While we couldn't perform our *Four Seasons* program with soloist Joseph Tawadros as we had planned, we instead gave four performances of *Baroque & Beyond*, a concert that traced the influence of the Baroque throughout the centuries, in Sydney's City Recital Hall.

While we were unable to tour to the US, Tokyo and Berlin as we had hoped, I was delighted to take the opportunity to travel a little closer to home when, in April 2021, we embarked on a tour to Bellingen, Armidale and Dungog to perform four sell-out concerts to our regional NSW audiences. And when international borders reopened in late 2021, I, along with my ACO colleagues Satu Vänskä, Stefanie Farrands and Timo-Veikko Valve travelled overseas for the first time in nearly two years to give four intimate performances for our London supporters.

We welcomed a new Director of Artistic Planning to the ACO in 2021. Toby Chadd joined the ACO from the ABC, brimming with inspired ideas, energy and boundless musical knowledge and I look forward to working with him for many seasons to come.

To our Chairman Guido Belgiorno-Nettis, Managing Director Richard Evans, my colleagues in the Orchestra, and the wider ACO administrative team: thanks a million. We did a lot of things differently in 2021 and none of it would have been possible without your support, expertise and enthusiasm.

And most importantly, thank you to our audiences. Everyone who came to a concert, bought a StudioCast ticket, watched a HomeCast, made a donation... we are only able to do what we do with your support. Thank you for your faith in us.

Chairman & Managing Director Report

2021 was a groundbreaking year for the ACO. In the midst of the most challenging period of the Orchestra's history, Richard Tognetti, with his trademark innovation, creativity, and zeal, created a pioneering hybrid season that presented the ACO's very first digital subscription, ACO StudioCasts, alongside our annual national touring season. Reaching over 180,000 online viewers across Australia and internationally, in addition to over 24,000 live concertgoers, we are pleased to say that this hybrid season was a resounding success.

The ACO opened its touring season with *Tabula Rasa*, an extraordinary concert that celebrated the overcoming of hardship through music, creativity, and the arts. *Tabula Rasa* was performed over six concerts in Wollongong and Sydney and showcased the virtuosity of Richard Tognetti and Principal Violin Satu Vänskä as soloists in Arvo Pärt's beloved work.

The Season continued with *Beethoven & Bridgetower*, a collaboration with Belvoir that explored the passion and drama behind Beethoven's most loved violin sonata over six concerts. Then in May, the Orchestra crossed the NSW border for the first time since early 2020 with *Schubert's Quintet*, which toured to Canberra and Melbourne, in addition to concerts in Wollongong and Sydney.

After enduring six months of concert cancellations due to ongoing lockdowns and border closures, the ACO made a triumphant return to the stage in November, one of the first arts organisations to do so, with Baroque & Beyond at Sydney's City Recital Hall. This program explored masterworks of the Baroque era before tracing its influence through the centuries and featured the premiere of Richard Tognetti's stunning new arrangement of Bach's *Chaconne*.

Alongside the Orchestra's live concert season, and throughout the COVID lockdown period, the ACO released seven cinematic and immersive concert films in its ACO StudioCast season. Created in collaboration between Richard and the ACO with leading director Matisse Ruby, and filmed at iconic locations from the grand Sydney Town Hall to the innovative new arts space Phoenix Central Park, these films showcased a new and musically invigorating performance experience in true ACO style.

While the national tour of *River*, Richard Tognetti's awe-inspiring multimedia collaboration with director Jennifer Peedom, was disappointingly unable to proceed as planned, the Orchestra recorded and released the film soundtrack with ABC Classic in mid-2021. The album features a spectacular score curated by Richard that features music from Bach and Vivaldi to Jonny Greenwood, William Barton and new music by Richard himself. The film itself received its premiere at the Sydney Film Festival in June to glowing reviews.

In early 2021 the ACO made a welcome return to the TarraWarra Museum of Art to perform four concerts, while in April Richard led the Orchestra on a tour of regional NSW, giving concerts in Bellingen, Armidale and Dungog to appreciative, sell-out audiences. The Orchestra also gave four world premieres in 2021, performing new music by composers Thomas Adés, Melody Eötvös and Paul Stanhope.

Our Learning & Engagement program continued to provide vital, high quality music education opportunities to hundreds of young people across Australia. This included the commissioning of a captivating new production for young children and their families, *Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge*. Based on the poignant picture book by Mem Fox and Julie Vivas, this incredible family show wove together captivating storytelling with a spectacular new score from composer Paul Stanhope and was performed over 24 concerts in the Sydney Opera House. Testament to the exceptional quality of this production, *Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge* was awarded 'Best Production for Children' at the 2021 Sydney Theatre Awards.

Richard Tognetti and Principal Musicians Helena Rathbone and Stefanie Farrands gave masterclasses for students at the University of Melbourne in May and June, while ACO violinists Aiko Goto and Liisa Pallandi ran workshops with young string players in Bellingen and Armidale in April. ACO Foundations, our life changing in-schools program at St Marys North Primary School in Sydney's Western suburbs, continued throughout 2021 and was delivered to students in Years 1, 2 and 4, with all teaching proceeding in-person with the exceptions of Term 3 and part of Term 4 when teaching was moved online in line with school closures.

Once again, we have been incredibly moved by the generous support of ACO audiences across the country during this exceptionally challenging year. In 2021 nearly half of ACO ticketholders donated the value of their tickets to COVID-cancelled concerts back to the ACO. We also acknowledge the essential and generous support that the ACO has received from the state and federal governments, as well as from our valued philanthropic patrons and corporate partners.

Before the extraordinary 2021 support is taken into account, the underlying general operations is a trading deficit of \$2,138,034 (2020: \$1,517,159 deficit).

However, after the occurrence of the following largely one-off extraordinary upsides:

- Extraordinary COVID support income is \$2,361,303 (2020: \$3,554,226), made up of:
 - NSW State and Federal Government support solely in response to COVID \$1,733,824 (2020: \$1,560,415) and
 - Generous one-off ticket donations from our patrons for cancelled 2021 live performances due to COVID \$627,479 (2020: \$1,993,811).

- Extraordinary capital-in-nature net surplus of \$6,427,044 (2020: \$1,039,614), consisting of:
 - Beguests of \$1,405,431 (2020: \$70,539 surplus),
 - Realised net investment earnings of \$1,208,737 (2020: \$171,705 surplus),
 - Recognition of an unrealised net gain on financial securities of \$1,355,867 (2020: \$65,691 surplus) as at 31 December,
 - Revaluation increment on ACO owned musical instrument valuations due solely to exchange rate movements of \$182,566 (2020: \$294,909 deficit), and
 - Net surplus contribution for the ACO New Premises Project at Pier 2/3 from donors despite COVID, of \$2,274,444 (2020: \$1,026,588 surplus) after direct establishment expenditure.

The 2021 overall total comprehensive income for the year is \$6,650,314 (2020: \$3,076,681).

There does remain considerable downside risk in our forward programs, and it may take several years to return to consistent performance levels and revenue of the pre-COVID era. Consistent with our not-for-profit status, all surpluses are reinvested in the mission of the ACO.

The ACO has a long-held desire to have its own home and in 2021 it remained in the final planning stages of securing its new premises as part of the revitalised Walsh Bay Arts Precinct Project at Pier 2/3.

The ACO estimates that the cost of all furniture, fittings and equipment, NSW Government payments, design and consultancy and relocation costs to be incurred in future years is likely to be circa \$21 million. To support its aspirations for a new home, in October 2021 the ACO launched the "public" phase of a capital campaign to support the project. The ACO has been delighted with the generous support received from patrons and philanthropists to date. \$2,674,896 in cash donations were received during 2021 [life-to-date as at 31 December 2021, \$13,049,905 (\$10,375,009 as at 31 December 2021)].

To the ACO's audiences in Australia and abroad - thank you for your unwavering support and faith in Richard and his incredible band of musicians. It is thanks to you that Richard has been able to push the boundaries of music-making and performance, throughout 2021 and long into the future.



ACO Instrument Fund

"The ACO Instrument Fund remains a oneof-a-kind investment fund with assets in rare historical instruments that are for the sole use of musicians of the ACO." In July 2021 the ACO Instrument Fund celebrated its tenth anniversary and stepped into the next phase of its life. In accordance with the Fund's Trust Deed, the Fund completes its first term at ten years from inception, then every five years thereafter. At the end of each term, a vote is put to the Fund's unitholders as to whether or not the Fund should be continued. Unitholders of the Fund unanimously voted for the Fund to continue at the unitholder meeting convened on 15 July 2021 via Zoom. A celebration and private concert was held on 4 March 2021 at the Art Gallery of New South Wales with speeches by the Fund's recently retired Chair, Bill Best, ACO Managing Director Richard Evans and ACO Artistic Director Richard Tognetti.

The ACO Instrument Fund remains a one-of-a-kind investment fund with assets in rare historical instruments that are for the sole use of musicians of the ACO. Under the direction of the Trustee of the ACO Instrument Fund, the Fund retained its four assets: a 1728/29 Stradivari violin, a 1714 Guarneri violin, a 1616 Brothers Amati cello and a 1590 Brothers Amati violin. After valuation in May 2021, the Trustee agreed to a modest increase in the instruments' underlying value by approximately 2%. At 31 December 2021, the Fund's assets were collectively worth \$9.3 million or USD 6.75 million (2020: \$8.58m or US\$6.6 million). This slight increase did not affect the unit price of the Fund which the Trustee resolved to maintain at \$1.45 in 2021.

While the ongoing challenges posed by COVID meant there were no new units issued in 2021, by year end there were four investments pledged to proceed in early 2022, equivalent to 98,701 units. To date these investment applications have either been completed or are well underway.

The Fund's long standing Chair Bill Best retired from the ACO Instrument Fund Board on 15 March 2022. Bill has been Chair and Director of the ACO Instrument Fund since December 2010. His wise counsel and significant experience ensured the prudent governance of the Fund over the course of its first important ten-year term. The ACO is indebted to Bill for his many years of tireless contribution to the Fund, as well as his generosity and patronage of the ACO.

The ACO welcomes JoAnna Fisher as the new Chair of the ACO Instrument Fund Board and wishes to acknowledge ACO Instrument Fund Directors Jessica Block, Edward Gilmartin, John Leece, Julie Steiner AM and John Taberner. The ACO also acknowledged the Fund's Australian Financial Services Licence holder, JBWere Ltd. Crucially the ACO acknowledges and thanks the unitholders of the ACO Instrument Fund for their investment and commitment to the ACO and the Fund.



In October 2021, the ACO broadcast a live stream reveal of its 2022 Season across Facebook and YouTube. The stream was hosted by SBS presenter Kumi Taguchi and included interviews with Richard Tognetti and Richard Evans as well as a special preview performance from the full ACO.

Over 1,000 viewers tuned in to watch the live stream and the video was then viewed more than 10,000 times.







Talent Development Programs

The ACO is committed to supporting and providing opportunities for young Australian string players. Our Talent Development programs:

- foster emerging young talent by providing the highest quality training and mentoring;
- provide critical pathways into the ACO and other professional music careers; and
- are highly impactful, potentially changing the trajectory of these young musicians' lives.

EMERGING ARTIST PROGRAM

The ACO Emerging Artist Program connects the next generation of talented young Australian string players with the professional members of the ACO, offering unparalleled mentoring, training and performance opportunities.

In 2021, the Emerging Artist Program was scaled back due to impacts of COVID and the 2020 Emerging Artists were offered a second year in the program for 2021. They were:

The Emerging Artists were able to continue to have private lessons and mentoring sessions with ACO musicians throughout the year, however the main ACO Collective program, a regional tour of QLD and NSW led by Helena Rathbone scheduled for August 2021, was unable to take place due to COVID restrictions.

ACO ACADEMY

The acclaimed ACO Academy, led by Aiko Goto and supported by Presenting Partner BNP Paribas, is our flagship education program for exceptional secondary school string players from across Australia. Launched in 2012, ACO Academy runs in the July school holidays every year in either Sydney or Melbourne, offering participants an immersive and intensive week of chamber ensemble playing.

Due to COVID restrictions, in 2021 the ACO again delivered ACO Academy in a 'virtual' format - providing talented young musicians the opportunity to be mentored by ACO musicians from their own homes. Twenty-five young string players took part in workshops, technique classes, private lessons, sectionals and orchestral sessions.

PYO ACADEMY

In March 2021, thirty-seven school-aged string players from Western Sydney took part in the Penrith Youth Orchestra Academy. Under the direction of ACO violinist Aiko Goto and other ACO musicians, students participated in intensive rehearsals, sectionals and workshops over the course of a weekend, culminating in a public performance at the Joan Sutherland Performing Arts Centre in Penrith.

BNP PARIBAS PATHWAY SCHOLARSHIP

The ACO and BNP Paribas announced two recipients of the inaugural ACO BNP Paribas Pathway Scholarship: 12-year-old Ethan Schempp and 16-year-old Aurora Beale.

The Pathway Scholarship was created by the ACO with the support of BNP Paribas to make music and artistic development opportunities more accessible for schoolaged musicians from diverse backgrounds, in particular First Nations young people.

The Pathway Scholarship is tailored to each recipient and includes support to cover activities such as private music lessons, participation in a local youth orchestra program, musical instrument assistance and access to coaching from ACO musicians.

Early Experiences

Early experiences have a critical impact on a person's life. Our flagship early years programs:

- ignite a love of music from an early age;
- make arts and cultural experiences accessible to all children and families; and
- open doors and increase aspirations for the future.

ACO FOUNDATIONS

The ACO Foundations Program aims to improve the academic and developmental outcomes for children through the study of music. The pedagogical model of the Program is informed by scientific and social research and introduces string playing into the school curriculum in a co-teaching design between classroom teacher and lead ACO music educators. A critical component of the Program is that students practise their instruments every day for 15-minutes during class time, alongside weekly lessons by ACO instrumental teachers.

2021 saw delivery of the Program at St Marys North Primary School in Western Sydney further expanded to include the entire new Year One cohort alongside the entire Year Two cohort who commenced in 2020. Despite some setbacks due to COVID, all students participated in nearly a full year of the Program (missing only Term Three due to COVID), taking part in daily practice sessions with their classroom teachers, twiceweekly group classes with ACO music educators, and a small group lesson once a week. Students showed a huge improvement in their focus and self-control, posture, fine motor skills and understanding of musical concepts.

FAMILY SHOWS

After the great success of the ACO's first early years' production, There's A Sea in My Bedroom (2019), in 2021 we commissioned, created and presented another new work for children aged 3 - 8 and their families. The work, Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge, based on the poignant picture book by Mem Fox, was adapted and directed by Sandra Eldridge with an original score by composer Paul Stanhope. It was performed by actors Vanessa Downing and Joshua Reckless, and ACO musicians Ike See, Maja Savnik, and Julian Thompson, and Beth Condon (Emerging Artist alumni) for a twoweek season in May 2021 to critical acclaim. Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge was presented over 24 performances in the Utzon Room at Sydney Opera House to over 3,800 people, while a love and ondemand stream of the performance reached a further 7,000 students in regional schools across Australia.

Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge was awarded 'Best Production for Children' in the 2021 Sydney Theatre Awards.

"Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge appeals to adults and children at several levels, emotional and intellectual. The cast and creatives have retained its complexity in the transition from page to stage. Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge captures the imaginations of young audiences igniting what will hopefully become a lifelong appreciation of the performing arts."

Strategic Plan Update

With the advent of COVID, in October 2020 the ACO formalised an updated Strategic Plan (COVID Recovery Plan) for 2021 - 2022. The ACO's strategic objectives from 2021 - 2022 are:

ACO VISION

To be considered one of the great chamber orchestras of the world, renowned for the integrity and excellence of our musicianship, the boldness and vitality of our programs, as well as our commitment to our audiences, present and future. We will be fueled by and the loyalty and growth of our audiences and supporters.

STRATEGIC GOALS 2021 - 2022

- Artistic Excellence and Extension: continue to create, commission and present new programs that are artistically excellent, innovative, vibrant and imbued with our distinctive character;
- Audience Development and Reach: continue to ensure that a broad range of Australians are able to access the ACO and engage with our artform and diverse programs;
- Nurture our sector: maintain our commitment to supporting the development and growth of the next generation of Australian artists and our sector more broadly; and
- Organisational strength: maintain best practice in governance, financial and people management.

To achieve these goals, and within the confines of COVID restrictions and impacts, in 2021 the ACO was able to undertake the following activities:

01 ARTISTIC EXCELLENCE AND EXTENSION:

- Continued to commission and perform new work at the forefront of artistic practice including new Australian work that reflects contemporary Australia through:
 - Commissioning orchestral works by Australian composers Melody Eötvös (Meraki) and Paul Stanhope (Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Partridge) which received their world premieres in 2021:
 - Co-commissioning orchestral work by UK composer Thomas Adès (Shanty - Over the Sea), which received its world premiere in 2021;
 - Commissioning orchestral works from Australian composers Holly Harrison (Australian Winter) and Paul Stanhope (Giving Ground) and US composer Samuel Adams (Electric Violin Concerto). The premiere of these works was postponed due to COVID restrictions;
 - Commissioning orchestral works by Richard Tognetti, William Barton and Piers Burbrook de Vere for the film collaboration River, which was premiered as part of the Sydney Film Festival in 2021;
 - Commissioning a new multimedia project The Crowd & I with film and staging director Nigel Jamieson and cinematographer Jon Frank.

- Commissioning a new musical and theatrical work for children in their early years, How to Catch a Star, based on the book by Oliver Jeffers, from Australian composer Elena Kats-Chernin and Director Sandra Eldridge, to be premiered in 2022.
- Continued to develop partnerships with individual artists, ensembles, arts companies and presenters to enable the ACO when financially possible to develop, present and disseminate new and experimentation work of all musical forms through:
 - Collaborating with Belvoir and writer Anna Goldsworthy for Beethoven & Bridgetower in March and Belvoir for Baroque Revelry (postponed directly prior to scheduled performances commenced due to COVID restrictions), and Sydney Opera House for the family show Wilfred Gordon McDonald Partridge in May; and
 - Collaborating with outstanding Australian Director Matisse Ruby and award-winning Audio Director Bob Scott, as well as acclaimed cinematographers Tyson Perkins and Drew English to create and premiere the inaugural season of ACO StudioCasts, which included seven cinematic 50-minute films.
- Worked to address barriers across key diversity areas in our commissioning, partnership and presentation activities through telling diverse stories and engaging with diverse collaborators including:
 - Continuing the ACO's longstanding relationship with the Aboriginal singer, multi-instrumentalist and composer William Barton, including commissioning the writing and performance of new works as part of the *River* film score;
 - Developing a new collaboration including the work of African-American poet Rita Dove in Beethoven & Bridgetower, a project shining a light on the diverse history of a major classical work;

- Featuring the work of acclaimed Indigenous Australian cinematographer Tyson Perkins in ACO StudioCasts:
- Presenting a relaxed performance of Wilfrid Gordon McDonald Patridge;
- Developing and launching a season of five relaxed performances at ACO Pier 2/3 in 2022; and
- Preparing audio description for all ACO StudioCast films.
- Continued to secure high profile international engagements that enable the ACO to present innovative Australian art and artists on the world's most prominent international stages:
 - Regrettably the Orchestra's scheduled performances in the US (Stanford, Lincoln Center and Princeton), Tokyo (Kioi Hall), Berlin (Pierre Boulez Saal) and London (The Barbican Centre) were unable to proceed as planned due to COVID restrictions however the ACO continued its relationship with audiences in the UK through four performances by a small ensemble of ACO musicians in the UK in December.
 - The Orchestra's Berlin and UK performances have been rescheduled to 2022, with US and Japan performances in planning for 2023.

02 AUDIENCE DEVELOPMENT AND REACH:

- Presented 56 live public performances across locations including Sydney, Melbourne, Canberra, Newcastle, Wollongong, Bellingen, Armidale and Dungog;
- Used ACO StudioCasts and ACO HomeCasts to nurture and develop national, regional and international audiences between touring visits to key markets.
- Continued to invest in the release of recordings through the release of the River film soundtrack album in partnership with ABC Classics and Stranger Than Fiction Films;
- Delivered 4,500 hours of music education activities for 260 participants.
- Engaged with regional Australia through a tour of the ACO to Bellingen, Armidale and Dungog including the delivery of a workshop and concert with the Bellingen Youth Orchestra - in April and through the provision of complimentary access to an ACO StudioCast film to audiences in Bundaberg and Lismore when the planned ACO Collective Tour in August to these centres was unable to proceed due to COVID restrictions; and
- Continued to work with the NSW Government in the planning and development of an accessible home for the ACO at Pier 2/3 as a hub for artistic exploration, music education, and community engagement.

03 NURTURE OUR SECTOR:

- Invested in the artistic development of seven of Australia's most talented string players at the outset of their professional careers through the ACO Emerging Artist Program via both in-person lessons where possible and online lessons where required due to COVID restrictions for each emerging artist with their ACO mentor;
- Nurtured the next generation of world class string players through three masterclasses for students of the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music and a four-day, online version of ACO Academy for 25 secondary school students from across Australia; and

Presented, collaborated and partnered with small to medium music and other arts organisations, individual artists, ensembles and training institutions including the Australian National Academy of Music, Penrith Symphony Orchestra, The Joan Sutherland Performing Arts Centre and the Bellingen Youth Orchestra

04 ORGANISATIONAL STRENGTH:

- Kept our musicians as core assets in place and in premium playing form through creating opportunities for the preparation and delivery of as many live performances, ACO StudioCasts and ACO HomeCasts as possible during a year of significant travel and performance restrictions due to COVID;
- Leveraged opportunities created by Federal and State Governments' responses to COVID and other new funding initiatives to secure increased government funding for the ACO to support touring, live performances and concert films where possible;
- Continued the Pier 2/3 Capital Campaign to secure capital and operating funds from private individuals for the development and operation of the ACO's new home on Pier 2/3:
- Continued to ensure that the ACO is resourced with the best musicians and administrative staff to enable it to achieve its strategic vision;
- Continued to utilise strong governance practices to lead a nimble and responsive organisation, whilst effectively managing financial and other risks; and
- Continued to ensure that ACO box office and development revenues are effectively managed and augmented with the support of contemporary infrastructure, training and support.

Corporate Governance Statement

Introduction

This statement outlines the Australian Chamber Orchestra's (ACO) corporate governance practices and addresses the Essential Governance Practices for Arts Organisations published and monitored by the Australia Council for the Arts in January 2021.

The implementation of the governance practices embodied in the ACO's Governance Manual continues to ensure that the ACO achieves compliance with the Australia Council's Essential Governance Practices for Arts Organisations January 2021, the Australian Institute of Company Directors Not for Profit Governance Principles, Second Edition January 2019 and the ACNC Governance Standards.

The Board is committed to ongoing strengthening its governance practices. Its compliance with each of the Australia Council's Principles of Good Arts Governance with reference to the relevant sections of the ACO's Governance Manual, is outlined below.

PRINCIPLE 1

Vision and Mission

As per the Board Charter of the ACO Governance Manual, a central element of the Board's purpose is to establish the Company's vision, mission, values and ethical standards and delegate an appropriate level of authority to management.

ACO VISION

To be considered one of the great chamber orchestras of the world, renowned for the integrity and excellence of our musicianship, the boldness and vitality of our programs, as well as our commitment to our audiences, present and future. We will be fuelled by and the loyalty and growth of our audiences and supporters.

ACO MISSION

To inspire and challenge audiences everywhere through the music we play.

ACO VALUES

- United Individuals: we are diverse and inclusive.
 Everyone brings something unique to our team.
 It's our collective experience, skill and spirit that connects us as one.
- Mastery: we are committed to excellence. Our skills are fuelled by unwavering dedication and passion.
 We've taken the time to learn the rules so we can choose how we break them.
- Adventure: we are intrepid and inspiring. Our imagination is boundless. We transport our audiences to visceral worlds where they can experience the power of raw human emotion.
- Transformation: we are curious and courageous. We never stop searching for new and unexpected ways of challenging ourselves and our audience. While our music is steeped in history we are not afraid to explore revolutionary ideas.

PRINCIPLE 2

Performance

The ACO Board Charter notes the Board's role of bringing an independent and objective view to the Company's decisions and overseeing the performance and activities of management, including through contributing to the development and overseeing implementation of corporate strategy, and approving the business plan, budget and corporate policies.

The ACO is committed to having a Board of effective composition, size and commitment to adequately discharge its responsibilities and duties. The ACO's Governance Manual incorporates Board and Committee Charters, a Board Code of Conduct and Director selection and induction processes. The Manual also sets out the duties and responsibilities of the Board with regard to the Company's overall operations, performance and compliance and defines the role of the Chair, the processes for selection, appointment and renewal of directors and the Board performance review process.

The Board includes Directors with a diverse set of skills and experience. This experience is set out in their biographies published in the ACO's Annual Financial Report. All Directors are independent. The Board is supported by its Nominations and Remuneration Committee in the recruitment of new Directors and the process for evaluating Board performance.

The ACO acknowledges that its ongoing success is reliant on ensuring the ACO continues to have the skills and expertise necessary to achieve our goals. Succession planning across key Board, Artistic and Management roles within the Company is a focus for the Board and specific initiatives and practices in relation to this are articulated in the ACO's Strategic Plan and Risk Management Framework.

PRINCIPLE 3

Systems

The ACO has processes in place that independently verify and safeguard the integrity of the organisation's compliance and management reporting. The ACO Finance, Audit and Risk Management (FARM) Committee includes members with appropriate audit, finance and risk management expertise. The Committee meets prior to every Board meeting and comprises up to three Directors and, by invitation, the Managing Director, the Chief Financial Officer and Chief Operating Officer. This Committee's responsibilities and duties cover review of the Company's management and statutory accounts and accounting policies and the results of the annual audit as well as making recommendations to the Board on the appointment. reappointment or replacement, remuneration and monitoring of the effectiveness of the external auditors.

The ACO is committed to ensuring that the level and composition of remuneration is sufficient and reasonable and that its relationship to organisational and individual performance is defined. The Company's Remuneration Policy and Processes are set out in the Governance Manual. The Board's Nominations and Remunerations Committee is responsible for reviewing and recommending to the Board the remunerations of the Managing Director and the Artistic Director. Staff and executive salaries are approved by the Board as part of the annual budget approval process. As a not-for-profit charitable institution, payment of any fees or salaries to directors of the Company is prohibited, in accordance with its constitution.

PRINCIPLE 4

Manage Risk and Compliance

The ACO has established a sound system of risk oversight and management and internal control. This system is designed to identify, assess, monitor and manage risk. The Company's risk management policy, responsibilities and processes for review of the risk management system are set out in the Governance Manual. The policies are further delineated in the company's Risk Management Framework.

The Board has the ultimate responsibility for overseeing the risk management framework and monitoring business risks and is assisted in discharging this responsibility by the FARM Committee whose responsibilities in relation to the Company's risk management system are contained in the Committee's charter.

Organisational risk is under continual review. In accordance with the ACO's Risk Management Framework, the FARM Committee considers the Company's risk profile as part of the annual program and budget setting process and in turn reports to the Board.

In conjunction with the recent organisational review of policies, the ACO's WHS Management System was most recently reviewed and updated in late 2019. This System provides for regular consultation with employees, mechanisms for WHS risk management, reporting of incidents and injuries, a workers' compensation framework and training of employees. WHS reports are prepared for each meeting of the FARM Committee and Board.

To assist the Board in discharging its responsibility in relation to compliance, the Board has delegated the monitoring and review of compliance to the FARM Committee. An Annual Compliance Calendar is maintained in order to monitor requirements and reporting obligations.

PRINCIPLE 5

Relationships


The ACO respects and observes its legal and other obligations, including the rights of all legitimate stakeholders. These principles are enshrined in the Company's Compliance Policy within the Governance Manual and Stakeholder Communication Strategies. The Board's duties and responsibilities specifically include ensuring effective communication with key stakeholders. The Code of Conduct sets the standard of ethical behaviour required of Directors, including ensuring that all stakeholders are recognised for the contributions they make and ensuring full, fair and understandable disclosure in reporting and public communications.

The Board both oversees and contributes to the ACO's organisational culture through oversight of how culture is defined and aligned to organisational strategy. The Board holds accountable the Managing Director and the Artistic Director for how culture is communicated and embodied.

The ACO's procedures for handling conflicts of interest, actual or potential, are embodied in the Governance Manual.

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
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
