Celebrating 50 Years of the Australian Chamber Orchestra

In 2025 the **Australian Chamber Orchestra** celebrates 50 years of invention, curiosity and unforgettable music-making.

With Richard Tognetti at the helm, in what will mark his 35th year as the ACO's pioneering Artistic Director, **ACO 2025** encapsulates the intrepid and collaborative spirit for which the Orchestra has become internationally renowned. Steeped in a rich musical tradition while simultaneously disrupting expectations of what an orchestra can be and do, the ACO presents bold musical ideas that challenge and inspire, redefining the very nature of classical music in the process.

"In 1975, visionary Australian cellist John Painter gathered an ensemble of string players who shared his dream of creating a group where they could control their musical destinies," explains Tognetti. "This ensemble, boldly named the Australian Chamber Orchestra, made its debut that November in the Sydney Opera House, performing to a sold-out Concert Hall.

"In the years since, the ACO has gone on to perform over 5000 concerts for audiences around Australia and the world, from that first concert in the Sydney Opera House to Western Australia's Ningaloo Reef where we shot and performed one of our first experimental ventures into film, The Reef, to London's Barbican, becoming the first Australian orchestra invited to hold an international residency in one of the world's great concert venues.

"For our 50th Anniversary Season, I am delighted that we will be embarking on new collaborations with friends from around the world, alongside celebrating the remarkable talents of my colleagues in the ACO; some of the finest string players on the globe."

The ACO will celebrate its 50th Anniversary Season with extraordinary international guest artists, from South African cello sensation **Abel Selaocoe** and electrifying violinist **Patricia Kopatchinskaja** to cabaret and drag phenomenon **Le Gateau Chocolat**. The Orchestra will perform five world premieres, including special ACO commissions from composers **Nigel Westlake**, **Holly Harrison**, **Valentin Silvestrov** and **David Lang**, and a new work by **PatKop** (Patricia Kopatchinskaja) and present its critically acclaimed film collaboration, **Mountain**.

THE 2025 SEASON

BRAHMS & BEETHOVEN

The ACO will open the 2025 Season with two masterpieces that showcase the artistry and ambition for which the Orchestra is globally renowned. **Richard Tognetti** will take centre stage in Brahms's mighty Violin Concerto, bringing his characteristic flair to this pinnacle of the violin repertoire, followed by a performance of Beethoven's Symphony No.7. Joining the ACO onstage are current and former members of the ACO Emerging Artists Program, which celebrates 20 years in 2025, along with brass and woodwind players handpicked from orchestras around the world.

ABEL SELAOCOE

International cello sensation **Abel Selaocoe**, a musician who has redefined the parameters of his instrument, will make his Australian debut in a concert that moves seamlessly across a plethora of genres and styles. The curiosity and calibre of the ACO is a perfect match for Selaocoe's charisma, as he and his regular collaborator, percussionist **Sidiki Dembélé**, join the Orchestra to perform his own original music alongside a new commission from Nigel Westlake and Giovanni Sollima's electrifying double concerto *When We Were Trees*.

BACH TO THE BEACH BOYS AND BEYOND

Acclaimed theremin virtuoso **Carolina Eyck** will join Tognetti and the ACO for a deep dive into the thrilling sound world of the first electronic instrument. Jaunty, ghostly, wild, and wonderful, the theremin is an instrument of chameleon-like ability and utterly unique. Together with the ACO, Eyck will transport audiences to other worlds, performing music that traverses from blockbuster films to the experimental avant-garde.

DEATH AND THE MAIDEN REVEALED

Patricia Kopatchinskaja (aka PatKop) is electrifying. The Moldovan-Austrian-Swiss violin sensation will reunite with the ACO for the first time in more than a decade to bring her brilliance and virtuosity to music including Ravel's showpiece *Tzigane* and Schubert's *Death and the Maiden*, alongside her own intoxicating and richly inventive *Danses Macabre*.

GERSHWIN & SHOSTAKOVICH

Ukrainian-born, internationally renowned pianist **Alexander Gavrylyuk** will make his ACO debut in a program directed by Tognetti that celebrates the life-affirming power of music. Featuring Gershwin's joyful *Rhapsody in Blue* and Shostakovich's witty, irreverent Piano Concerto No.1, this is music that shines a light on human ingenuity and courage in the face of darkness.

A MUSICAL AWAKENING

ACO Principal Cello **Timo-Veikko Valve** will take centre stage to direct a program that nourishes the soul. Joined by regular ACO collaborator, Australian recorder virtuoso **Genevieve Lacey**, Valve and the ACO will explore the ways in which music can heal the body and mind, from Hildegard von Bingen's *Ave Generosa* to Max Richter's *On the Nature of Daylight*.

COCTEAU'S CIRCLE

The ACO will conclude the 2025 Season with a night of celebration and surprise. Joined by six-and-half foot tall cabaret sensation **Le Gateau Chocolat**, Tognetti, the Orchestra and Australian soprano **Alexandra Oomens** step into the heady world of 1920s Paris, bringing to life the music of Erik Satie, Lili Boulanger and 'Les Six' – composers including Francis Poulenc and Darius Milhaud. Directed by Circa's **Yaron Lifschitz**, this promises to be a spectacular evening of storytelling, song and surrealism.

SPECIAL GALA

MOUNTAIN

The ACO will bring back one of its most groundbreaking, award-winning and popular cinematic collaborations for a series of limited gala performances. Created in collaboration with BAFTA-nominated director and filmmaker **Jennifer Peedom** (*Sherpa* 2015, *River* 2021), *Mountain* pushed the creative possibilities of presenting music and film live in concert in an innovative new direction.







ABEL SELAOCOE (Australian debut) Cello & Guest Director Abel Selaocoe

In a classical music industry that encourages performers to be either/or, Selaocoe has chosen both — and more.

South African cellist Abel Selaocoe is redefining the parameters of the cello. He moves seamlessly across a plethora of genres and styles, combining virtuosic performance with improvisation, singing and body percussion. He has a special interest in highlighting the links between Western and non-Western musical traditions, with a view to helping classical music reach a more diverse audience.



SIDIKI DEMBÉLÉ (Australian debut) African Percussion Abel Selaocoe

Sidiki Dembélé hails from an ancient line of Malian Griot musicians, raised in the cultural traditions of his ancestors. He is an accomplished multi-instrumentalist, who performs across a range of mediums and genres including with orchestras and as musical director and performer with theatre and ballet companies including the Royal Shakespeare Company and the Royal Ballet at Covent Garden.

Earning international prizes in London, Italy and Greece such as the Rovere d'Oro, and touring Japan and the USA as cultural ambassador for Australia, Cislowska's accolades include ABC Young Performer of the Year, the Freedman Fellowship, an Art Music Award for 'Performance of the Year' and the 2015 ARIA award for 'Best Classical Album'.

Elton was Principal Trumpet of the London Symphony Orchestra (2017–2021) under the baton of Chief Conductor Sir Simon Rattle and he regularly performs as a guest Principal Trumpet with the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra, Philadelphia Orchestra, New York Philharmonic, Chamber Orchestra of Europe, and Mahler Chamber Orchestra.



ALEXANDER GAVRYLYUK (ACO debut) Piano Gershwin & Shostakovich

A stunningly virtuosic pianist, Gavrylyuk is internationally recognised for his electrifying and poetic performances. He was Artist-in-Residence at Wigmore Hall for the 23/24 season.

Le Gateau Chocolat's work traverses genre and format. The six-and-half foot tall, six-inch heeled, wig-clad musical phenomenon has trodden Bark of Millions with Taylor Mac at Sydney Opera House and BAM New York, performances at Royal Festival Hall and Royal Albert Hall, Barbican with Basement Jaxx and Metropole Orkest, Glyndebourne, The Globe Theatre, Edinburgh Festivals and Bayreuth. He performs the likes of Wagner to Whitney Houston, Purcell to Radiohead and continues to subvert what it means to be a true icon in the post-genre era.

Jennifer's films have played at multiple A-list international festivals, winning awards including the Grierson Award for Best Documentary at the BFI London Film Festival, an AFI Award, and a BAFTA nomination. Her film *Mountain*, created in collaboration with the ACO, became the highest grossing Australian documentary of all time.
