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

Pekka Kuusisto ACO Collective Artistic Director & Violin

Violinist, conductor and composer Pekka Kuusisto is Artistic Partner of the Saint Paul and Mahler Chamber orchestras, Artistic Director of the ACO Collective and Artistic Best Friend of the Deutsche Kammerphilharmonie Bremen.

Highlights of the season include concerto appearances with the NDR Elbphilharmonie, Chicago, NHK, Gothenburg, MDR, Swedish Radio and Finnish Radio symphony orchestras, and the Tonhalle-Orchester Zürich where he is an artist "in focus". Kuusisto returns as violinistdirector-conductor to the Tapiola Sinfonietta, the Norwegian, Swedish and Scottish Chamber orchestras. He also is the featured artist for Amsterdam's annual Prinsengrachtconcert – the largest classical open-air concert in the Netherlands.

An advocate of new music, Kuusisto will premiere this season concerti by Nico Muhly and Enrique Chapela, as well as performing other works written for him including Daníel Bjarnason's Violin Concerto and Anders Hillborg's *Bach Materia*.

Kuusisto is a gifted improviser who engages with people across the artistic spectrum, recently with Hauschka, neurologist Erik Scherder, electronic music pioneer Brian Crabtree, and folk artist Sam Amidon. Together with Samuli Kosminen, Kuusisto co-composed the score to the new animated *Moornins* television series. He also collaborated with Cannes award winning director Juho Kuosmanen, performing in the Greenpeace campaign film *The Elegy of the Forest*.

His recordings include Erkki-Sven Tüür's Noesis, Sebastian Fagerlund's Darkness in Light, Hillborg's Bach Materia and Bach's Brandenburg Concertos Nos. 3 and 4.



Nico Muhly Composer

Nico Muhly (b.1981) is an American composer and sought-after collaborator whose influences range from American minimalism to the Anglican choral tradition. The recipient of commissions from The Metropolitan Opera, Carnegie Hall, Los Angeles Philharmonic, Tallis Scholars and St John's College, Cambridge and others, he has written more than 100 works for the concert stage, including the opera *Marnie* (2017), which premiered at the English National Opera and was staged by the Metropolitan Opera in the fall of 2018.

Muhly is a frequent collaborator with choreographer Benjamin Millepied and, as an arranger, has paired with Sufjan Stevens, Antony and the Johnsons and others. His work for stage and screen include music for the Broadway revival of *The Glass Menagerie* and scores for films including the Academy Award-winning *The Reader*. Born in Vermont, Muhly studied composition at the Juilliard School before working as an editor and conductor for Philip Glass. He is part of the artist-run record label Bedroom Community, which released his first two albums, *Speaks Volumes* (2006) and *Mothertongue* (2008). He lives in New York City.

WHAT YOU'RE ABOUT TO HEAR

Your five-minute read before lights down

Steve Reich

Duet

Steve Reich is one of the most significant figures in 20th-century music, being one of the pioneers of "minimal" music along with La Monte Young, Terry Riley and Philip Glass. Reich's particular brand of minimalism involves the use of canons (in which one voice follows another), pulsing patterns, and repetitions of small cycles of music to create a trance-like effect. One of his most significant musical innovations, "phasing", was born out of the use of tape loops – playing two identical tapes at once and letting them drift out of sync with each other, creating incredible patterns and harmonies.

His *Duet* for two violins and strings was composed in 1994 and is dedicated to Sir Yehudi Menuhin and "to the ideals of international understanding which he has practiced throughout his life." The piece is built around simple unison canons between the two violins who, from time to time, slightly vary the rhythmic distance between their two voices. As an accompaniment to the two solo violins, the strings create a wash of sound that seems to pulse and shimmer endlessly while undergoing subtle changes in harmony.

Missy Mazzoli

You Know Me From Here (arr. strings)

The string quartet is arguably the most personal genre a composer can tackle. Mozart's quartets show us how he admired and followed in the footsteps of his friend, Joseph Haydn; Beethoven's quartets are a summation of his career; Smetana and Janáček wrote quartets about intensely personal aspects of their lives. Another composer in this concert, Nico Muhly, has said he has "a huge anxiety about string quartets; they are normally meant to be giant expressions of a composer's life". Missy Mazzoli seems to have no such reservations, and in her string quartet You Know Me From Here she attempts to capture the emotional scale not of her own life, but of a couple's long-term relationship.

The piece was commissioned by Carol Magnus Cole in honour of her husband Tim Cole's 75th birthday. Mazzoli sums up the three movements as "a trek through chaos, then loneliness, to a place of security and companionship." Accordingly, the first movement 'Lift your fists', features an aggressive pace and bursts of anger. The second, 'Everything that rises must converge' rapidly slows down, and starts to feature individual instruments against a chordal background. Finally, the third movement 'You know me from here', blends the two moods. Mazzoli describes the end of the piece as "a raucus love song", encouraging us to remember that real energetic emotion is earned with effort and time.

Andrea Tarrodi Birds of Paradise

Andrea Tarrodi is one of Sweden's leading composers. Her music, which is often inspired by the natural world and seeks to "connect music with images and colours", has been performed at London's Barbican Centre and Royal Albert Hall, the Berlin Philharmonie and Vienna's Musikverein. In 2018, her album of string quartets, performed by the Dahlkvist Quartet, won a Swedish Grammy Award for best classical album of the year. Tarrodi has alleged that her compositional style usually commences with a non-musical idea that builds into "a sort of map with colours and symbols that define the form of the piece". In *Birds of Paradise*, which was written for Musica Vitae in 2008, the non-musical inspiration was a BBC *Planet Earth* film "about the strange and beautiful birds of paradise. Their many different colours, the way they fly and the way the sound and sing...". Bird calls permeate the work and form the entire middle section, while the musical swells that encompass them provide an overwhelming sense of the birds' place in the world.

Alex Mills

One is Fun (world premiere)

Welsh composer Alex Mills studied at Cambridge University and with Raymond Yiu, winning "Young Composer of the Year" at the 2011 Edinburgh International Harp Festival. His music has been performed at London's Barbican Centre and LSO St Luke's, and broadcast on BBC Radio. He has worked with the likes of Nico Muhly (assisting him on his 2017 opera Marnie and score for the BBC series Howards End) and the Grammy Award winning ensemble Eighth Blackbird. His first opera, Dear Marie Stopes, premiered in London in 2018, and his second opera, Leonardo, based on the life of Leonardo da Vinci, premiered at London's V&A this November.

One is Fun was composed in 2016, but receives its world premiere in Melbourne today. The piece can be played by two violins or by solo violin with tape, prompting comparisons with the "phasing" technique of Steve Reich, whose *Duet* for two violins and strings features in this concert. However, where Reich uses speed to gradually separate or "phase" his soloists apart, Mills uses rhythm, register, dynamics and slight variations in pitch. In doing so, he creates a constant state of intrigued stress, or a "push-pull effect ... where the tension continuously builds and releases, often spilling over into hockets where the two parts are both dependent on and independent of one another".

Nico Muhly

Shrink: Concerto for Violin and Strings (world premiere)

Nico Muhly is one of the most celebrated and sought-after classical composers of the last decade, with works spanning instrumental, orchestral and choral music, to film music and opera, being the youngest composer ever commissioned by the Metropolitan Opera. He has also collaborated extensively with both classical and popular musicians, including Philip Glass, Björk and Sufjan Stevens.

His concerto for violin and string orchestra, *Shrink*, was commissioned by the Australian Chamber Orchestra and Melbourne Recital Centre. The concerto is dedicated to Pekka Kuusisto, and receives its world premiere in this concert. In *Shrink*, Muhly takes the concept of the traditional violin concerto and completely inverts it, focusing not on the monumentality of the orchestra, nor the virtuosity of his soloist, but the intricacy of how they work together. Muhly writes:

"Shrink is in three movements. Each movement obsesses over certain intervals: the first, ninths; the second, sixths; and the final, a tiny set of anxious intervals between unisons and fourths. The overall structure suggests an intensifying focus on these small buildingblocks, a process which is reflected in the speed of each movement. The first proceeds quickly, becomes aggressive, and dissolves into small fragments. The second movement is slow and taut, with a looped sequence of chords whose character becomes increasingly thick and heavy. The last movement is fast, nervous, and scattered, with occasional giant unisons coming in and out of focus."

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
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
